

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Interconnected

The Vision and Fulfillment of the Education Department

he educational department has been part of Mystic Arts Center for only a quarter of its 100-year history, but its impact has been significant and remarkable. From its foundation the education department has supported both aspiring and working artists, paving the way to expand the organizational mission to include a richer creative community. The department continues to follow this path, and again seeks to extend that circle of interconnectedness. By providing an even broader-based art education, the organization is able to foster its role in the arts to enrich community life

For most of its history, Mystic Arts Center (formerly known as Mystic Art Association) focused primarily on exhibitions. Throughout the years individual artists would from time to time provide private lessons using the gallery space, but it was never regular. Lessons, when they did occur, were held during summer months and only during operational hours. Students had to be comfortable with gallery visitors moving about the room as they worked. "The show would be up, and we'd have classes in the Liebig gallery or the Davis gallery, while people were walking around. It was strange, but that's what we did," explains Marjorie Ciminera, former Executive Director (1980-1995).

In 1987, the board of the MAA discussed ways to improve their public appearance. "We wanted to dispel the myth that we were a club and branch out to the community. People thought the organization was only for certain artists," says Pam Gordinier, former board member and teacher. Each of the board members (Bill Topkin, Paul White, Pam Gordinier, Otto "Pat" Liebig, and Lois Constantine) and Executive Director Marge Ciminera had their own ideas on how to accomplish this task, but it was

Gordinier who championed the cause for education with the aid of Lois Constantine. "It was a time that just felt so unified," Constantine says "Whenever someone had a dream, others wanted to support it."

Gordinier explains that their big question was whom they wanted to attract to fulfill who they, as an organization, wanted to be. Their answer was to reach out to children and adult aspiring artists in addition to the already skill-building working artists. The intention was to broaden the community to include all ages and skill levels with the larger goal of becoming interconnected with in the lifecycle of the artist and to facilitate artistic expression in the region. "We were willing to change, willing to be current," says Gordinier.

Between 1994 and 1998 the number of students had doubled, yet conversations about building a studio seemed stuck in an infinite loop. One day in the winter of 1998, Katherine "Kate" Tod Johnstone, former president, honorary member, elected artist, and volunteer, came in with a check for \$125,000 and handed it to, then president, Anthony Halsey. "If this doesn't motivate you, nothing will," Johnstone reportedly said. In February of that year, the board and staff began fundraising for the remaining \$275,000 that was needed to break ground in November later that year.

In June of 1998, Tamara Rich was hired as the first paid director of education. The postition was part-time and a large portion of it was outreach and marketing of educational programs. "If I created a program, but did nothing to promote it within the community or find ways to let people know about it, then it wouldn't happen... A big job of mine was to try to interface with as many different people in the community as possible," recounts Rich.

In May of 1999 the Katherine Tod Johnstone Studios opened, and Johnstone was there to baptize the new space. "She was very Continued on Page 14

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



ill, but she was very committed to see the studio open! Her family and friends made it happen. At the opening ceremony, she spilled red paint on the studio floor, wrote her initials, and said, 'have fun,'" says Rich.

Throughout her tenure at MAC, Rich focused heavily on education for children, and thereby the growth of the next generation that would appreciate art. "It was important to make their experience a quality experience," she says, "We really tried to be relevant to what was going on in schools and the community," she explains. It was a holistic approach, recognizing the interdependence of the future of the arts in the area and the education of children.

In 2003, then president, Anthony P. Halsey, announced the kick off to the PARTNERSHIP Education Endowment Campaign to raise \$600,000 to support education outreach programs such as the Visual Thinking Curriculum, which was a MAA specific program designed by the Museum of Modern Art. Even though the current education department has expanded its teaching practice beyond VTC, the curriculum's focus on teaching critical thinking skills through art remains a priority.

Dawn Salerno joined the Mystic Arts Center in 2007 as the first full-time director of education She came to the position from a museum background, and she explains that she brought to the position a way of incorporating looking at, thinking about,

and discussing how artwork can help the viewer learn about art, life, communication, and or really any subject. Some of the programming she has introduced to MAC includes this aspect to help children relate what they are learning in the studio or classroom to the works on the wall.

Salerno is currently thinking about the organization's future in terms of important questions. "We are always going to be focused on the visual arts, but creativity is becoming a more important word in the mix. We are all creative, so what kinds of programs and formats are best to encourage that creativity? And how can MAC help create an environment that will help us along, whether we need inspiration, help getting past creative blocks, or skill building?" She is embracing the expansion of art education at MAC to include new and different art forms and program formats with broader appeal for the community.

Interconnectedness runs throughout the Mystic Arts Center, from the staff and members that often take on multiple roles in the organization, to the classes that connect skills and theory with art inspiration and socialization. Ever widening circles of creative people continue to be welcomed into the fold as MAC endeavors to broaden its community reach. The education department has contributed tremendously by serving approximately 2000 adults and youth annually. The department continues to be a fount of new ideas and innovative approaches to engage the community, and plans to well into the future.

WILLA T. SCHUSTER

DECEMBER 4, 1939 - JUNE 27, 2013

AC lost a very special friend in June. Willa T. Schuster passed away at the age of 73. For those who knew Willa, you know what an extraordinary person she was. For everyone else, I'm sorry you didn't have the chance to know her.

Willa had physical challenges from contracting polio at the age of fifteen, but with strong family support and a keen intellectual curiosity, she did not let that tragic event define who she was or what she would accomplish throughout her life.

The Schuster family was very supportive of the Mystic Art Association and its artists. Willa's father, a Mystic dentist, would help local artists by taking paintings in payment for his service. As a junior member at age twelve, Willa and her siblings would pass hors d'oeuvres at the opening receptions.

Tragically, by the age of fifteen Willa's polio would cause her to be paralyzed from the neck down. She retained some mobility in three fingers on her left hand and would even learn to type with a mouth piece. After spending one year in an iron lung and two years on respiratory assistance, Willa went on to finish high school at Williams School. She completed her education at Connecticut College, graduating Phi Beta Kappa and cum laude, with a Bachelor of Arts in Philosophy. It was, an extraordinary accomplishment at a time where most schools were not equipped with handicap accessible spaces.

After graduation, Willa contributed her time and energy to many civic organizations in the area: the Mystic Junior Women's Club, Mystic & Noank Library, and the Mystic Historical Society, among others, even serving as the troop leader for her niece's Brownie Troop. Willa received Community Service Award from the Mystic Chamber of Commerce in 1983.

In the 1990's Willa continued her parent's tradition of support for the Mystic Art Association and began serving on various committees, Long Range Planning, Permanent Collection and Centennial among others. She also served as the President of the Board of Directors for 1998-2000 and became an Honorary Member in 2011.

Willa was quick to laugh and always sought to put others at ease. She wrote in 1989 about her disability, "Joy can be found in the smallest things. You find yourself with a greater sensitivity to the needs and feelings of others. You find that negative aspects of life are all part of the on-going learning experience and become the source of strength for what lies ahead."

Thank you, Willa, for supporting us, for teaching us, and for being our friend.
